

Example 8-12: Noise filtering by Thresholding.

Purpose:

A signal given by
 $x(t) = 1 + 4 \sin(10\pi t) + 10 \cos(20\pi t + 0.6435)$
 has broad-spectrum noise added to it. The goal is to retrieve the original signal $x(t)$ from the noisy signal $x_{ns}(t)$, *without* knowledge of the original signal. The signal-to-noise ratio is -2.56 dB. Develop a simple technique to retrieve $x(t)$ from the noisy signal.

Inputs:

NS=noise strength (multiplies `randn`).
 T=threshold for noisy spectrum.

Outputs:

Plots of noisy (top) and filtered (bottom) signals for $0 < t < 1$ s.

Spectrum of noisy signal (top) and thresholded spectrum (bottom).

Signal-to-noise ratio (SNR) in dB.

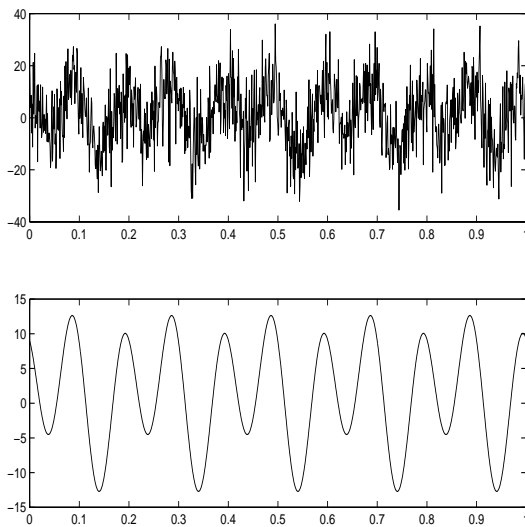


Figure 1: Plots of noisy (top) and filtered (bottom) signals for $0 < t < 1$ s.

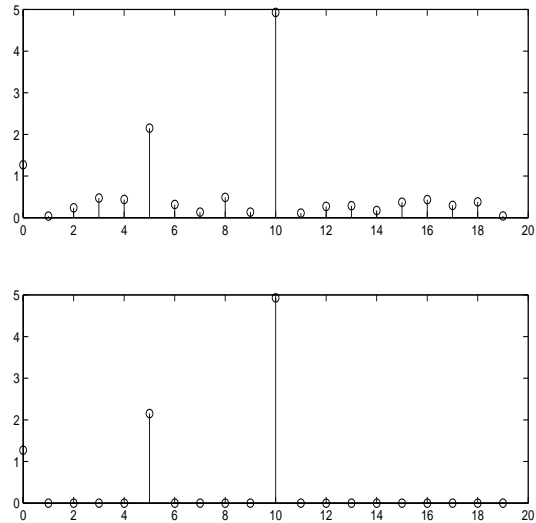


Figure 2: Spectrum of noisy signal (top) and thresholded spectrum (bottom).

Comments:

- Two-sided spectra are plotted for $f \geq 0$.
- Stem plots are used for spectra, since DFT computes them at discrete frequencies.
- We did not use knowledge of the signal.
